



EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS:

- Get Informed
- Make a Plan
- Make a Survival/Emergency Kit
- Be Aware

EMERGENCY EVACUATION:

- Listen to the Radio/TV for the most up-to-date information
- Review the Tsunami Evacuation Maps in your phone book
- Have a telephone listing of all your family, friends and business contacts including off-island contacts with you at all times
- Familiarize yourself and your family with transportation routes in the event your main route is blocked
- Look for the "Evacuation" sign on the front of the bus – these buses will take you to the nearest available shelter
- Each person is allowed 1 large bag
- Pets may ride on the bus, but will need to be in a kennel and/or leashed



SURVIVAL/ EMERGENCY KIT:

- Water - one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- Non-perishable food for 5 -7 days for each person
- Infant formula and diapers
- Can opener for food (if kit contains canned food)
- Pet food and extra water for your pet
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Whistle to signal for help
- Cell phone with chargers, inverter or solar charger
- First aid kit
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Prescription medications and glasses
- Household bleach/disinfectant wipes
- Feminine supplies & personal hygiene items
- Complete change of clothing including a long sleeved shirt, long pants and sturdy shoes
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person
- Dust mask to help filter contaminated air and plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Fire Extinguisher / Matches in waterproof bag
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification & bank account records in a waterproof, portable container
- Cash or traveler's checks and change
- Local maps

As a concerned citizen of the City and County of Honolulu, you are important in helping to keep Hawaii a safe place to live and visit.

Due to the ongoing threats against the people in our country, it is important that we all do our part to keep our Island a safe place.

As a bus rider, you can help to keep TheBus a safe mode of transportation. We all should be concerned with threats to our security. Here are some of the signs that we need to look out for as we ride the bus and travel around our community.

If you notice any of these things, don't stall. Tell the bus operator or call 911 right away.



SUSPICIOUS SUBSTANCES

Use Your Best Judgement

If you notice a strange powder, mist, liquid or an unusual odor, tell the bus operator.

SUSPICIOUS PERSONS

Trust Your Instincts

Suspicion should be based on type of behavior, location, and time of day. If you see someone doing something unusual, loitering or doing something that just doesn't seem right, notify the bus operator or call 911.

SUSPICIOUS PACKAGES

If You Are In Doubt

If you see an unattended bag, backpack, package, etc. that seems out of place or has unusual attachments, sounds or odors, notify the bus operator.
